2005 Barry M. Moriarty Graduate Paper Competition

Sponsored by the Southern Regional Science Association

Annually, SRSA awards a prize to the student submitting the best paper in the area of Regional Science. The following qualifications apply:

- The student must be enrolled full-time at an accredited academic institution sometime during the year following April, 2005;
- The student must be sponsored by a member of SRSA; and
- The winning student is expected to present the paper at a session of the 2005 Meetings of the Association in Arlington, VA, April 7-9, 2005, using the award to defray costs of attending.

Papers must be double-spaced, no more than 25 pages in length, and written in the style of *The Review of Regional Studies*. The cover page should include: the paper's title; the author's full name, address, and telephone and FAX numbers; similar information for the sponsor; and an abstract of 100-150 words.

Five copies of the paper must be submitted by January 5, 2005 to:
